a. Dewittville Creek - We just finished up the stream project on the Country Ayre Farm. It involved a fish weir along with streambank stabilization. This will stabilize the bank to protect the bridge that they use to get to the farm.

b. 28 Mile Creek - We will have this project completed by the end of October.

c. Chautauqua Marina - We hope to be done with this project by the end of the week; this is 750' of rock for shoreline stabilization.

NRCS-NY Announces Application Cutoff Dates for NRCS Conservation Programs

Jamestown, N. Y., September 20, 2013– New York Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announces October 18, 2013 as the application cutoff date for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) for Fiscal Year (FY)2014. Applications accepted after October 18, 2013 may be considered for funding if additional application rounds are announced or for potential consideration in FY2015. All applications are competitive and are ranked based on national, state and locally identified resource priorities and the overall benefit to the environment.

Although a new Farm Bill has yet to be approved, applicants may still apply for funding through the same programs offered through the 2008 Farm Bill. At the time of application, applicants must specify the resource concern(s) that they intend to address. Once further guidance on the 2013 Farm Bill is provided, NRCS will work with applicants to transfer applications to the appropriate conservation program.

"NRCS NY looks forward to helping farmers and rural landowners address priority resource concerns on their land," said Donald Pettit NRCS State Conservationist. "Each year NRCS offers a variety of programs which help landowners address a wide range of conservation needs in New York."

- Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP): offers financial assistance for practices which address soil erosion, water quality and habitat degradation. Practices implemented through EQIP include strip cropping, grassed waterways and manure storage facilities. Focus areas within the EQIP program include soil health, livestock waste, habitat, forestry and grazing.
- Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP): helps participants restore and protect fish and wildlife habitat in grassland and shrubland areas.



Willard Fox Croney, retired professor

Willard Fox Croney died peacefully Monday, Sept. 2, 2013, at home surrounded by family in Rehoboth Beach. Croney was born in Newport in 1928. He was married to Eileen Wise Croney, also a Delawarean, for 64 years. They lived most of their married life in upstate New York.

Willard Croney was the last survivor of the John Wesley Croney Sr., family of Wilmington and Newport.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by three daughters: Linda C. Christopher of Groton, N.Y., and her daughters Katy and Brynn; Liesse C. Pollio of Hockessin, and her husband Gary and children Laura and Robbie; and Lori C. Poerio of Arnold, Md., and her husband Mark and children Nate, Sonia, Alissa,

and Julia.

Croney served in Egypt, North Africa and Italy in the U.S. Army 1942-45. He was educated in both the United States and Europe with degrees from the University of Delaware and Cornell University, and as a British research fellow at the University of Glasgow, Scotland.

Croney was active in soil and water conservation for 40 years, most of it as a faculty member in extension of the College of Agriculture, Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y. Upon the retirement of his long time colleague and friend, Professor Harry A. Kerr of Cornell, Croney was appointed executive director of the New York State Soil and Water Conservation Committee by the dean of the College of Agriculture at Cornell. His function was to guide county soil and water conservation districts of New York.

Croney developed many techniques for using stereoscopic aerial photography and later satellite imagery to determine aspects of the natural sciences for planning land use and for agriculture.

Croney retired in 1983, and upon his retirement the employees of the New York Soil and Water Conservation Districts established the Willard F. Croney Distinguished Conservation Award to be given annually to the outstanding conservation district employee in the state.

A committal service with military honors will be held at 10 a.m., Friday, Sept. 13, at Delaware Veterans Memorial Cemetery, 2465 Chesapeake City Road, Bear, DE 19701.
